




Public Health and Professional Standards Principal Secretary Mary Muthoni has emphasized the need for preventive measures in tackling diseases, urging Kenyans to prioritize handwashing and early health screening.

Speaking during a women empowerment programme at Murgor primary school grounds in Kesses constituency, Uasin Gishu County, the PS noted that many illnesses spread because they were detected too late.

Muthoni noted that government through the Community Health Promoters (CHPs) program, was offering household-level health services including blood pressure checks, diabetes screening, child health assessments and referrals for hospital treatment.

She further encouraged citizens to register with the Social Health Authority (SHA), cautioning against politicizing health issues.

Muthoni pointed out that those discouraging registration often rely on private medical insurance abroad.

The state has cushioned registered citizens against extra costs, she added, noting that government hospitals at Level 2 and 3 are not supposed to charge patients who are already registered with SHA.

At the same time, the PS raised concern over the rising inflow of illicit drugs into the country through various entry points.

She condemned some unscrupulous traders for exposing school children to harmful substances such as narcotics, nicotine and tobacco products, warning that such illicit products cause cancer and other life-threatening conditions that endanger the future of young people.

"The government will not tolerate the importation of nicotine and tobacco products that are killing our children,"

she warned.

The PS stressed that diseases know no borders whether under the national or county governments and called on all Kenyans to play an active role in combating them.

Muthoni reaffirmed that the government is working with county administrations to ensure hospitals operate effectively, insurance matters are well managed and that every Kenyan receives quality healthcare.

She further emphasized that President Dr. William Ruto's administration is committed to its Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) for the country, aimed at ensuring better livelihoods for the people.

The PS who was accompanied by several area leaders also highlighted the government's postgraduate training program for doctors, where medical graduates receive specialized skills before being deployed back to their counties to strengthen health services.

"Efforts are also underway to increase the number and expertise of doctors through specialized training programs and their eventual deployment to counties," she added.

The PS remarked that collaboration between the national and county governments remains vital in enhancing healthcare and insurance across the country.

Sh 231 Million Rural Electrification Project To Benefit Households In Kakuzi-Mitubiri, Gatanga

- "This is not just about power in homes. It is about poverty eradication, spurring growth, and creating opportunities because with electricity, residents can run businesses, power boreholes and even contribute to reducing carbon emissions from diesel and kerosene," he said.

Residents of Kakuzi-Mitubiri ward in lower Gatanga constituency, Murang'a County, have a reason to smile as more than 2,500 households in one of the region's most marginalized and semi-arid areas, were officially connected to electricity.

The milestone came with the launch of the Matunda Electrification Project presided over by Energy Principal Secretary Alex Wachira, who assured residents that the government was committed to achieving universal access to electricity and uplifting communities that had long been left behind.

"Today is a testament that we are leaving no region behind in last mile connectivity," he said.

"In Gatanga alone, we have allocated Sh231 million for 38 electrification projects and today we have launched all the 18 projects being implemented by REREC. The rest will be executed by EFBC and KPLC, and by December 2025, all the targeted households will be connected," said Wachira.

The PS noted that a further Sh880 million had been allocated to connect more than 110,000 households to electricity in Murang'a county.

"This is not just about power in homes. It is about poverty eradication, spurring growth, and creating opportunities because with electricity, residents can run businesses, power boreholes and even contribute to reducing carbon emissions from diesel and kerosene," he said.

Wachira also acknowledged previous challenges surrounding the provision of meters, assuring residents that every home connected to the grid would receive a meter without delay. Murang'a Woman Representative Betty Maina welcomed the project, saying it would greatly benefit women and families who had long been disadvantaged.

"Electricity means empowerment for a society. Women will now be able to open salons, baking businesses and other small enterprises that improve their incomes," she said.

"Genuine leadership is about solving the people's problems. In this regard, we sincerely thank the Kenya Kwanza administration for the continued support towards the electrification of our once marginalized homes," Betty said.

Maragua MP Mary Wamaua echoed the sentiments, stressing that electricity is a foundation for development.

"There is no development without electricity. But with power, a lot can be achieved from creating jobs to reducing pollution from diesel generators that we have seen here. Today is

the beginning of real transformation for Gatanga," she said.

For residents, the launch was more than a ribbon-cutting event as it was the fulfillment of a long-awaited dream.

Joseph Kimani, a farmer, described how electricity would change his life and transform his family's standards as budding agripreneurs in the area.

"I have fish, cows, goats and also grow mangoes and oranges, using a borehole which was previously powered by diesel.

Now with electricity, I will save a lot of money and I plan to use power for a chaff cutter to mill fodder and bones, as well as maize cobs for my animals and for other farmers.

With electricity and water, this place will continue developing, notably

even the price of land has gone up compared to a few years ago. The economic outlook of this area will change," he said.

Kimani added that electricity would also open opportunities for maize milling and other small industries

Another beneficiary, Prisca Njeri, said the project was life-changing for families, especially mothers and children.

"We are happy because even during sickness, when we had bedridden people in the house, we relied on kerosene lamps. Now we have electricity. Our children will be able to study properly without being affected by smoke from lamps," she said.

Security will also improve because the place is well lit. In the past, darkness brought many cases of muggings," said Njeri, noting that this time round, the connections had reached more households than in previous projects.

"This time most households have benefited, unlike before when only a few were connected. We will now be able to rear chicken, grow more crops, and open salons and barber shops for empowerment," she said.

Meanwhile, as the cables were switched on and bulbs lit up in Kakuzi-Mitubiri, Friday evening, a sense of joy and optimism surged through the community.

For a region once left behind, the electrification project marked not just access to power, but a promise of a more fulfilling brighter future.

He questioned the logic of committing future revenues to current borrowing needs, noting that such measures sidestep deeper questions of fiscal mismanagement.

"Kenya's public debt is now over KSh12.1 trillion. In the last three years alone, we have borrowed more than KSh3.5 trillion. When you securitize levies meant for roads and fuel, you are not solving the problem, you are postponing it while mortgaging the future of our children," he told the gathering.

Ndindi further expressed concern that these new securitized bonds and deals were being pursued without sufficient parliamentary oversight, warning that such "back door arrangements" would lock the country into long-term financial obligations. Proponents of securitization argue that the mechanism unlocks funding for critical projects such as roads and solar electrification without increasing the official debt figures. Critics, however, maintain that the approach undermines fiscal transparency by disguising borrowing while still committing public revenues far into the future.

The Nyeri Town MP, who co-hosted the event, hailed the forum as a landmark opportunity for Nyeri residents to connect with business opportunities within their county.

"This expo is about more than

showcasing products; it is about bringing businesses together, creating networks, and exposing Nyeri residents including Christians and the wider community to the opportunities that already exist here," he said

Mathenge emphasized the need to build a referral network among Nyeri entrepreneurs to strengthen local trade.

"When we know what businesses exist in our county, we can support each other, refer each other, and keep the money circulating here at home," he said.

He praised CITAM for curating an event that not only displayed local innovation but also connected Nyeri's small and medium enterprises to new markets. "The real opportunity in business is stepping out of our comfort zones" he said.

This expo has proven that Nyeri people are ready to compete, innovate, and prosper," the MP noted.

Turning back to the day's theme, Ndindi Nyoro drew a distinction between three categories of wealth creators—business people, entrepreneurs, and investors.

"Whether you are in business, entrepreneurship, or investment, the ultimate goal is the same, making money and creating wealth. But each path is different. Businesspeople trade to earn profit, entrepreneurs innovate to solve problems, while investors take calculated risks to multiply returns," he explained.

He emphasized that entrepreneurship required careful market study and long-term vision, warning participants against rushing into ventures without adequate planning. "You cannot wake up and make business decisions in a hurry. Real opportunities come when you step out of your comfort zone," he added. Ndindi cited the disruption brought by artificial intelligence tools such as ChatGPT, unknown just a few years ago, as examples of how innovation could redefine industries and create new opportunities.

The CITAM Business Forum, now in its third year, has grown into a significant platform for local businesses. This year's edition attracted more than 50 exhibitors, ranging from agribusinesses and manufacturers to service providers and startups. The event sought to expose Nyeri residents to the diversity of businesses in the region, create referral networks, and open up opportunities for collaborations.

According to the organizers, the annual expo provides an avenue for Christian entrepreneurs and the wider Nyeri business community to network, showcase products, and learn from industry leaders.

Dr. Wale who co-headlined the forum with Nyoro, challenged participants to rethink their approach to opportunities.

"The big question is: where are you not looking? Many times opportunities are hidden in the places we ignore. Business growth requires shifting our perspective and breaking mental barriers," he said.

Among the exhibitors was Iria-ini Tea Factory from Othaya, a Kenya Tea Development Agency (KTDA) affiliate supporting about 7,000 smallholder farmers. Its chairman, Paul Muturi, said the expo offered a unique platform to promote the factory's premium tea brands directly to consumers.

"As farmers, we depend on sales to sustain livelihoods. Currently, only about 3% of our sales are through factory door sales, but with such exposure, we are targeting to grow this to 10%, while another 10% comes from direct sales, and the rest goes to the Mombasa auction," Muturi explained.

He added that selling more directly to consumers would cushion farmers from price fluctuations and delays at the auction. "We have no stocks lying idle in Mombasa anymore. That means farmers can expect better and faster earnings," he said, noting that Ndindi Nyoro was gifted samples of Iria-ini's premium tea bags during the event.

Muturi praised CITAM for organizing the expo, calling it a landmark opportunity for businesses in Nyeri. "This kind of initiative has given us the chance to showcase what we produce and to interact with new markets. It is our hope that it will become a permanent feature in the Nyeri business calendar," he said.

As the curtains came down on the two-day forum, the mood was one of optimism. Organizers hailed the event as a success, noting that it had deepened networks among local businesses and challenged mindsets on entrepreneurship and investment. For Nyoro, the lessons went beyond profit margins. "The true opportunity lies in innovation, discipline, and long-term vision. Whether in business or government, we must make decisions that yield growth without mortgaging the future," he concluded.

With over 50 exhibitors, thought-provoking sessions, and a renewed call for fiscal responsibility, the 3rd CITAM Business Forum reaffirmed its place as one of Nyeri's most significant annual gatherings for business leaders, entrepreneurs, and investors.

Parents Of Nyeri Hillside Endarasha Academy Oppose Government's Plan For Open Public Inquest

Parents of the 21 boys who perished in a dormitory fire at the Hillside Endarasha Academy, Nyeri county have opposed plans by the State to subject investigations into the tragedy to a public inquest.

The parents have asked the government to first make public the findings from the investigations, which were conducted by the Directorate of Criminal Investigations.

They said that it was only fair that they are given an opportunity to interrogate the report, establish if there are any gaps, before deciding whether or not a public inquest into the incident is necessary.

"We have been told that the file has been recommended for public inquest and as a parent, I object that because a public inquest means that the investigations that had been going on for one year have failed.

Before we go for the inquest, we need to get the inconclusive report because the investigating agency DCI was there for almost a month and it means this public inquest is an after-thought, maybe there is something they are trying to cover up," said Cyrus Chege, whose son Roy Victor Muturi died in the fire.

The parents are also demanding for the release of DNA results as well as postmortem results of the 21 boys who lost their lives in the night inferno on September 5,2024 at the school.

They said that they were shortchanged. They said that the government asked them to inter the remains with the promise of surrendering the DNA and postmortem results immediately after the funerals.

"The games started on that day, when they took us to the dormitories to view the remains because they knew all along they wanted to take advantage of us.

We were told in three months heads would roll but months passed. In January I walked into the DCI office to ask for my DNA results and postmortem, but I was told that because of the seriousness of the matter, the investigations were being handled from Nairobi. They took us for granted, they treated us like fools. All we were demanding for and what we are demanding is justice for our sons which has not been served even today," said Victor Kiragu.

The parents spoke during a memorial and candle lighting service which was held last Friday at the Nyeri Catholic Secretariat Hall to mark the first anniversary of the tragedy.

The service was organized by the inter-religious Council of Kenya, a co-

alition of all major faith communities in Kenya.

Emotions ran high as parents and relatives of the victim's decried frustration and neglect from the government agencies, the school administration and political leaders, despite numerous pledges for support for the bereaved families.

"The government abandoned us after the burial. What really hurts is that we have never gotten justice. These are young innocent souls that the government should have stopped at nothing to ensure that justice was

served. To be honest, we would have held protests to demand justice, but these are children. I would plead with the government to ensure that justice is served," said Vivian Maina, who lost her brother in the fire.

"We are not going to get justice, unless we fight. And fighting means speaking out. All the 21 boys were innocent, their friends cannot fight for them, it is up to us the parents and we are not going to stop.

We are saying we are not even looking for compensation; we just want to know the truth of what happened.

When we know the truth we will be able to heal and the souls of the 21 boys we lost will rest in peace," said Timothy Gikonyo, another parent.

Religious leaders present promised to continue providing support to the parents until the truth into what transpired is unearthed.

They also called on the state agencies responsible to expedite the administration of justice for the families of the victims.



CS Kagwe: Packaging Tea In Kenya Key To Freshness, Traceability And Farmer Gains

Agriculture and Livestock Development Cabinet Secretary Mutahi Kagwe has called on countries and investors to package tea in Kenya for export, saying it is cheaper and guarantees a higher value for both producers and buyers.

Speaking at the North America Tea Conference in South Carolina, Kagwe announced that the government has removed taxes on packaging materials for agricultural products. The move, he said, allows Kenyan exporters to package tea at source according to international market specifications, delivering direct-to-shelf products with assured freshness, traceability, and better returns to farmers.

"By packaging at origin, we eliminate unnecessary costs, improve competitiveness, and strengthen Kenya's position in the global tea market," Kagwe told delegates.

Accompanied by Tea Board of Kenya Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Willy Mutai, KTDA Chairman Chege

Kirundi and his CEO Wilson Muthaura, together with the Kenyan ambassador to the US David Kerich, CS Kagwe also highlighted Kenya's leadership in global tea production, noting that the country produced 598.47 million kilograms in 2024, a 4.95 percent increase from the previous year.

The growth was driven by favorable weather, subsidized fertilizer programs, and expanded processing capacity.

Kagwe further pointed to Kenya's diversification into Orthodox and specialty teas, with purple tea, developed at the Tea Research Institute, standing out as the only variety of its kind in the world. Celebrated for its health benefits and antioxidant content, purple Orthodox tea fetches three to four times the price of black tea.

"Kenya's innovation in tea not only

secures better earnings for farmers but also places us ahead in meeting shifting global consumer demands," he said.

The Cabinet Secretary underscored tea's environmental and cultural importance, describing it as both a livelihood and a crop that conserves ecosystems by preventing soil erosion, supporting biodiversity, and sequestering carbon.

Kagwe concluded by urging the U.S.

market to embrace Kenyan black, green, and purple teas, noting that quality would always find a market.

Others who accompanied the CS in the US tour who mission was to increase Kenya's tea exports there which currently account for just 2% of total shipments were Vincent Mwingirwa, the General Manager for Sales and Marketing at KTDA and Engineer Ngatia, the KETEPA Managing Director.

Activist Blames "Recycled Leaders" For Entrenched Corruption, Rights Abuses

Corruption and human rights abuses will persist in Kenya if voters continue to elect the same political class, analysts warn, raising doubts about the potential for meaningful reform under recycled leadership.

Dr. Isaac Newton Kinity, a Kenyan unionist and activist based in the United States, argues that this practice has entrenched corruption and impunity for decades, with ordinary citizens bearing the burden of failed governance.

Dr Kinity pointed to a consistent estimate of Kenya's losses: in 2021, then-President Uhuru Kenyatta stated the country was losing two billion shillings daily to corruption. Treasury Cabinet Secretary John Mbadi cited the identical figure this year, confirming the hemorrhage of public funds has not abated.

"That is an enormous amount of money. For the last 50 years, the

same individuals who plunder public resources have been recycled into leadership, while ordinary Kenyans continue to suffer," Dr. Kinity said in a statement.

He argued that corruption spares no sector, equally impacting workers, farmers, business owners, and youth. This looting, he claimed, is perpetuated by a system of political brokers—many whom he described as 'descendants of colonial-era chiefs and home guards'—who protect entrenched interests and shield leaders from accountability.

"These people do not care about children, mothers, or the elderly. Their only goal is to get money, money stolen from public coffers, so they can extort more in the name of political campaigns," Dr Kinity said.

He dismissed the idea that veteran politicians bring valuable "experience," stating that what they recycle is a legacy of "land grabbing, corruption, extrajudicial killings, and abductions."

Dr. Kinity urged Kenyans to break

the cycle by rejecting both the leaders and the power brokers who sustain them. He insisted transformative change is possible by electing patriotic and bold leaders ready to sacrifice for the country.

"In just two years, corruption can be dismantled. In two years, land grabbing can be stopped. In two years, extrajudicial killings and abductions can end," he said, arguing that effective leadership does not require decades in office.

A committed president, he said, could restore normalcy within five years. Instead, he lamented, Kenyan leaders cling to power for decades, enriching themselves while the country stagnates.

His comments come amid renewed government focus on graft. Last week, President William Ruto called widespread corruption the biggest threat to the 2010 Constitution, stating it prevents Kenyans from enjoying the charter's full benefits.

"It is a fact that corruption exists in all arms of government – the Executive, the Legislature, and the Judi-

ciary, and each must confront this menace with honesty and resolve," he said during the constitution's 15th-anniversary commemoration. However, President Ruto's newly unveiled Multi-Agency Team on War Against Corruption has been temporarily halted by the High Court. On August 20, Justice Bahati Mwamuye suspended the presidential proclamation establishing the 11-member task force pending a full hearing on its constitutionality, following a petition by four citizens.

Remote, rugged, and strikingly beautiful, Meru National Park remains one of Kenya's most enchanting yet least crowded safari destinations.

Stretching across 870 square kilometers of wilderness, the park is often described as the "complete wilderness," offering a raw, authentic African safari experience that is both captivating and serene.

For travelers journeying from Nairobi, the Ura Gate entrance in Tharaka-Nithi County is the most convenient and shortest route into the park.

What makes this gate unique is the thrill that begins the moment one drives in—visitors are greeted almost instantly by wildlife, including the iconic Big Five.

At Ura Gate, guests are welcomed not only by wildlife but also by vibrant cultural expressions. The Ura Gate Traditional Dancers treat tourists to breathtaking songs and dances, while displays of Tharaka community artifacts give a glimpse into the region's rich heritage.

During a familiarization tour, journalists guided by Mr. Kaloki explored the park's unique attractions, including the rhino sanctuary, hippocampus sanctuary, lion stones and dedicated bird-watching sites.

With over 400 species of birds, the park offers an unrivaled ornithological experience, complete with a viewing facility that can comfortably host 20 visitors at a time.

Meru National Park has also overcome past conservation challenges. Once ravaged by poaching, the park has made a remarkable comeback. Today, it hosts thriving populations of elephants, giraffes, buffaloes, lions, leopards, cheetahs, and rhinos. Climate change, however, remains an ongoing challenge, according to Mr. Kaloki.

An Exploration Of Love In "The Dove And The Muse"

In her debut poetry collection, The Dove and the Muse, Nabude Constance Prima opens the doors of the human heart and lets readers wander through the many rooms of love—its joy, intimacy, and inevitable ache. Divided into three parts, the book offers a progression of emotions that reflect the life cycle of love: its blossoming, its flowering, and its lingering presence even after loss.

The first part, "Love Songs," celebrates the wonder of love in lyrical and narrative form. In 'A Love Like No Other,' the speaker declares: "Like a running brook that sings its melody at night, / Like a victorious soldier who returns home with gratitude... Love poured a cup of passion into my soul." Such imagery elevates

love beyond mere feeling, portraying it as a force that animates life itself. In another poem, 'I Fell for You,' the persona confesses: "Between your heart and mine was a bridge / Linking two paths that would help another / Reach their destination." Other poems celebrate love's depth with intimate comparisons. In 'Thinking of You,' she muses: "If you were a song, you'd be my ringtone, / and every time my phone rings, / I'd be reminded of rhythmic pulses." And in 'A Letter to My Future Husband,' she promises a love rooted in destiny: "The future will unbosom our encounter, / A brand-new leather covered book you will be, / And as we flip each page, we shall grow in knowing each other." These verses portray love as both everyday joy and an extraordinary destiny.

Part two, dubbed as 'The Lovey-Dovey Series' draws inspiration from the Japanese phrase "the moon is beautiful," a subtle yet profound way of saying "I love you." These twenty-five poems are written in the style of intimate letters, brimming with vulnerability and devotion. In Episode 2, the poet reveals: "You are the dream I never want to wake up from, / And by that, I find myself sleeping more every passing day." In Episode 4, she emphasizes perma-

nence: "Even when you cease your presence, / You'll remain my constant thought... / Even when dead, those who will carry my body to the grave / Will see your reflection on my face." The series also highlights intensity and surrender, as in Episode 5: "The earth trembles every time you cross my mind... All my prayers carry your name, / Take me as you will, / Make me your slave!" Through such epistolary poems, Prima channels the private tenderness of letters while inviting readers into the rawness of love confessed without restraint.

'The Muse Series,' the final part of the collection shifts to a tone of longing and reflection, capturing the essence of love that endures even after separation. In Dear Muse (Episode 7), Prima admits: "I thought things would be different this time, / I woke up with a river of poems again, / And when I picked my pen to write / Without thinking, I wrote your name again!" The pain of transience is hauntingly captured in Dear Muse (Episode 4): "You were my adorable Dove, / How I rejoiced seeing you fly away! / I was your Baby Moon... / But as short as summer fun, / We were just for a season!" Other pieces elevate memory into myth. In Dear Muse (Episode 10), she immortal-



izes her beloved: "I have created a constellation of you, / Thousands of years from now, / A young girl will flip these pages, / View the stars we once viewed / And she, too, will fall for you." These poems reveal that while the lover may vanish, the love remains—etched in words, memory, and art.

What makes The Dove and the Muse remarkable is its fusion of timeless literary echoes with intimate personal truths. By referencing Shakespeare's lovers, Keats's melodies, and Fitzgerald's romantic fervor, Prima places her voice in conversation with centuries of poet-

ic tradition, while still anchoring her lines in lived experience.

This collection is not only a personal outpouring but also a universal mirror. As Prima reminds us in 'Immortal Love I': "Someday, you and I shall be a love song, / And the verses shall become a triumphant melody / Of sacred vows of the rising sun and waning moon."

Through passion, vulnerability, and eloquence, The Dove and the Muse proves that love—whether joyous or sorrowful—remains one of humanity's most enduring truths.

General Assembly Adopts Resolution On UN-SCO Cooperation With Overwhelming Support



The UN General Assembly on Friday adopted a resolution with overwhelming support on cooperation between the United Nations and the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO).

The resolution, introduced by China and co-sponsored by nearly 40 countries, including all SCO member states, highly commends the constructive role of the SCO in promoting regional peace, development, mutual trust and cooperation. The resolution speaks highly of the SCO's efforts in supporting the work of the United Nations and expresses support for strengthened dialogue and collaboration between the UN and the SCO.

Geng Shuang, charge d'affaires of the Permanent Mission of China to the United Nations, introduced the draft resolution at the General Assembly. Geng noted that since its founding 24 years ago, the SCO has continued to grow under the guidance of the Shanghai Spirit and has become the world's largest regional organization. The most significant highlight of the SCO Tianjin Summit, he said, was Chinese President Xi Jinping's proposal of the Global Governance Initiative, which was warmly welcomed and actively supported by all parties, who agreed that the world urgently needs more effective governance visions and systems, making China's initiative most opportune and relevant.

At Friday's General Assembly session, representatives of Russia, Kyrgyzstan, Belarus, Pakistan, Iran, Cambodia, Cuba, Venezuela and Serbia spoke highly of the SCO Tianjin Summit and the work carried out by China during its rotating presidency. They emphasized that the resolution's adoption by the General Assembly with overwhelming support reflects the international community's recognition and support of the SCO. The representatives added that the Global Governance Initiative proposed by President Xi meets the needs of the times and will play a crucial role in addressing global challenges and enhancing global governance.

Rwanda's Gorilla Naming Ceremony Celebrates 40 Newborns

Rwanda's annual gorilla naming ceremony, known locally as Kwita Izina, took place Friday, with 40 baby gorillas named by global leaders, artists, football legends, conservationists, and Rwandan rangers.

Now in its 20th edition, the event was held at the foothills of Volcanoes National Park in Kinigi, Musanze District, northern Rwanda. Prime Minister Justin Nsengiyumva, who presided over the ceremony, reaffirmed the government's commitment to expanding the park by 25 percent to secure a future for the species. Eighteen of the baby gorillas named were born in 2024. Nsengiyumva noted the story of the mountain gorillas has not always been one of celebration, as years ago, their population had alarmingly decreased,

and their survival seemed uncertain. "However, thanks to the leadership of Rwanda, the dedication of passionate conservationists, the daily sacrifices of rangers, and the commitment of our communities, the gorillas came back from the brink," he said.

He added that the expansion of Volcanoes National Park would also improve the lives of the surrounding communities. "Conservation and development can go hand in hand. We call on the world to join us in this ambitious project as we share this responsibility," he said. Through initiatives like the tourism revenue-sharing program, which allocates 10 percent of revenues back to local communities, residents have benefited from improved schools, roads, and access to clean water. The dedication of rangers, trackers, and researchers, alongside global and local champions, has helped increase the mountain gorilla population in



the Virunga Massif from 880 in 2012 to more than 1,060 today, according to the Rwanda Development Board (RDB)
